## Gospel Reflection for the Epiphany That Epiphany Moment


It's funny how we are all a bit nicer on Christmas Day. Is it a pretence in order to get on with Great Aunt Ethel, or does Christmas really make us better people? For one day in the year we are a little more giving, a little kinder a little more tolerant. For one day in the year we are a bit closer to what God means us to be. Then we pile Christmas into the recycling bins, go back to work and revert to type. If there was a star for us to follow, we've quickly confined it to the box room with the tinsel and fake tree. Perhaps the three wise men arrive after Christmas to make us think again. Today the three wise men teach us a lesson in keeping our Christmas star alive. The wise men in the Epiphany gospel were visionaries with a star that they were determined to follow

The wise men in the Epiphany gospel were visionaries with a star that they were determined to follow whatever the obstacles. The wise men began their quest with a hunger for the truth and a determination to find answers. When they finally found Jesus lying in a lowly stable they came away happier and wiser men as a result. Following their star had given the three men a focus in their life and new meaning. We don't know what happened to them next, but it is likely they spent their lives sharing the good news with everyone they met, Jews and Gentiles alike. Following their star helped the Magi to be the people God had meant them to be. Sadly the same cannot be said for our own lives. We live our lives trying to be all things to all people. We live our lives dizzy with trying to live up to other people's expectations. We very rarely get time to be ourselves. We very rarely get that Epiphany moment of our own or get to know what God really wants of us.

So how do we follow our star? Firstly we have to have a vision. The new year stretches ahead like a clean sheet of paper. What does God want of us? Some people agonise over this question, but for many of us it's simply a case of looking at our talents and using them to make the world a better place. For others it might be about looking around and choosing one other person to build up. If we have impossibly busy jobs our vision might be a small one, if we have lots of free time we might be able to set a life changing goal. Having a vision is all well and good, but next we have to make plans and put those plans into action. This might involve sitting down and identifying obstacles. Remember that obstacles aren't always put in our way by other people. More often or not obstacles exist in our own minds and in our own character traits. As we travel towards our goal we have to determine in whom and in what to trust. When things get tough, it is easy to listen to a well-meaning friend encouraging us to take an easy way out, or adopt a more comfortable goal. "King Herods" don't always come in the obvious guise of a pantomime baddie. Lastly, we have to be able to recognise Jesus in our lives, and once we have found him, allow him to navigate.

ST JOSEPH AND ST BENILDUS CHURCH AND PARISH CENTRE NOW COMPLIANT WITH MODERN HEALTH AND SAFETY REGULATIONS.

St Joseph and St. Benildus Church and Parish Centre are now fully compliant with Health and Safety Regulations. We are very grateful to Mr. Tony Gleeson (Retired Chief Fire Officer) who alerted us to the fact that we were not compliant with modern safety standards and Tony made recommendations as to how we should upgrade our safety systems. Dr Pat Sheridan, Electrical and Mechanical Engineering Consultant, supervised the project, overseeing the design and installation of the new safety mechanisms to ensure compliance with the latest standards.

New signage had to be installed to ensure that exits were clearly marked. The exit door onto the church yard had to be refitted to open outwards and panic bars installed to facilitate ease of exit. We were required to erect a new platform outside the door and a

ramp for wheelchair exit.

A new emergency lighting system was designed and fitted which guarantees adequate lighting for safe evacuation of the church and hall in the case of fire or energy blackouts.

A new fire alarm system was installed in the church and hall and a security alarm which

is highly recommended by our insurers (Allianz) was fitted in both buildings. On the completion of the project, the Chief Fire Officer in Waterford Council was appraised of the works carried out and he signalled his approval that we were now fully

compliant with safety regulations.

We wish to express our gratitude to Dr Pat Sheridan who oversaw all aspects of the design and installation of the new system and Mr Tony Gleeson who was available at all

times for consultation.

The total outlay for the project was €24,782.00.
